FOR REFLECTION

Notice the pull of comparison.

- Where in my life do I measure myself against people who seem to live with more ease, money, or security?
- What feelings show up when I imagine that another world is just out of reach?
- Have I ever confused envy with aspiration, or comparison with clarity?



FOR CONVERSATION

Talk about hierarchy, dignity, and disguise.

- What does the film suggest about how class structures shape behavior, relationships, and self-respect?
- Why do people sometimes feel they must perform belonging in order to move upward?
- What happens psychologically when a person feels both invisible and judged at the same time?



TRY THIS

A small step toward grounded awareness.

- Notice one way class, status, or comparison shapes your mood this week.
- Name one place where you can choose dignity over performance.
- Ask yourself: what would it mean to want a better life without losing sight of my own humanity or someone else's?
